
BREASTFEEDING: FY 2018-2022

PERFORMANCE MEASURE (PM) 2 DEFINITION

Percent of TCs (target children) between 6 and 12 months of age (and whose mothers enrolled prenatally) who were breastfed any amount at 6 months of age

ALL HFNY MIECHV PERFORMANCE

 Recent Performance: About 40-50% of 6-12 month TCs across all MIECHV programs were breastfed any amount at 6 months of age between Q4 of FY 2021 through Q3 of FY 2022



MEDICAL EXCLUSIONS

Mothers who are not recommended to breastfeed due to certain medical conditions are **excluded** from this measure. This includes...

- TCs with galactosemia
- Mothers with HIV or T-cell lymphotropic virus I/II
- Mothers who use illicit drugs
- Few temporary situations (e.g., mother has Ebola virus, active tuberculosis, varicella, uses certain medications, etc.)

RESEARCH ON BREASTFEEDING

- Having more breastfeeding discussions during prenatal home visits is likely to increase breastfeeding initiation¹
- Having breastfeeding discussions during home visits is significantly associated with increased initiation and continuation of breastfeeding among prenatal and postnatal enrollees²,3



Having discussions about breastfeeding <u>early</u> and <u>often</u> can encourage breastfeeding initiation and <u>continuation</u>
